ELDER RIGHTS/ELDER PROTECTIVE SERVICES

The **Rhode Island Department of Human Services, Division of Elderly Affairs (DEA) Protective Services Unit**, 74 West Road, Cranston, RI 02920, is responsible for investigating complaints of abuse of Rhode Islanders 60 and older by a family member, caregiver or person with duty of care. Abuse may be physical, emotional, sexual, financial exploitation, or abandonment.

Self-neglect occurs when a person is no longer able to care for himself/herself. Reports of self-neglect are also made to the **DEA Protective Services Unit**. The senior's needs are assessed and necessary services can be provided.

Rhode Island law requires any person who has reasonable cause to believe that a senior has been abused, or is neglecting his or her basic needs, to report it to **DEA**. Failure to report abuse of a person 60 or older can result in a fine of up to \$1,000.

Abuse and self-neglect reports can be filed 24 hours a day, any day of the week and on nights, weekends and holidays, by calling 401-462-0555. Reports may be made anonymously.

ELDER RIGHTS/ELDER PROTECTIVE SERVICES

HOME AND COMMUNITY CARE /CORE PROGRAM

Home and Community Care Programs provide eligible seniors with innovative options to help them remain in the community and avoid premature institutionalization. Based on eligibility, **Home and Community Care Core** programs may provide home health aide services, adult day services, Meals on Wheels, Senior Companion, personal emergency alert systems, minor home modifications, or minor assistive devices. If appropriate, placement in an assisted living facility may be made. For most **Home and Community Care Core** programs, a person must be 65 or older, be a Rhode Island resident, and be basically homebound (unable to leave home without considerable assistance). For some persons on Medical Assistance, support services and assistive devices may be provided at no charge.

HOME AND COMMUNITY CARE/CO-PAY PROGRAM

Co-payment amounts are determined by the client's income level. LEGAL SERVICES

Advance health care directives are written instructions indicating what type of medical intervention you choose. The durable power of attorney for health care permits you to appoint an agent, or more than one agent, to make health care decisions on your behalf, if you are unable to communicate your wishes. A living will directs your physicians, in advance, to withhold or withdraw life-sustaining procedures, if those are your wishes. MEDICAL ASSISTANCE (MEDICAID)/ COMMUNITY

Medical Assistance Fee-For-Service is “traditional” **Medical Assistance (Medicaid)**. Health or medical benefits are obtained directly from a provider that accepts Medical Assistance. Individuals over age 65 may be eligible for Medicaid if they are a Rhode Island resident, have a work history of less than 10 years that disqualifies them for Medicare, have income at or below 100% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) and have resources of less than \$4,000 for an individual or \$6,000 for a couple. If an individual’s income is at or above 100% of the FPL, they may still qualify for Medicaid if they have medical expenses. The “flex test” may reduce their income to fall within Medicaid guidelines.

Adults with disabilities may be eligible for Medicaid if they are 18 years or older, a Rhode Island resident, receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI), or have income less than 100% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) and have resources of less than \$4,000 for an individual or \$6,000 for a married couple. MEDICAL ASSISTANCE (MEDICAID)/ LONG TERM CARE

Medicaid Long Term Care (LTC) services are available for individuals over age 65 and for adults with disabilities. Services include nursing home care or home and community-based supports such as homemaker/CNA services, special medical equipment, Meals on Wheels, personal emergency response systems, case management, Senior Companions, assisted living, respite, or minor home modifications. Individuals must require a certain level of care to qualify. Only individuals who qualify for the highest level of care are eligible for nursing facility care. MEDICARE

Medicare is the nation's health insurance program for people 65 and older, and younger people who are disabled for 24 months, or who have end stage renal disease. **Medicare** consists of four parts—Part A (Hospital Insurance), Part B (Medical Insurance), Part C (Medicare Advantage Insurance Plans) and Medicare Part D (Medicare Prescription Drug Plans). Persons over age 65 are automatically entitled to Medicare Part A if they or their spouse are eligible for Social Security or Railroad Retirement.

Part A covers inpatient hospital, skilled nursing facility, home health and hospice care. Part B is optional insurance that supplements Part A coverage. Part B covers medical and physician services, outpatient hospital, home health, durable medical equipment, laboratory and x-ray, ambulance and other services. MEDICARE PREMIUM PAYMENT PROGRAMS

Medicare Premium Payment (MPP) programs help adults over age 65 and adults with disabilities pay some or all of the cost of their Medicare Part A and Medicare Part B premiums, deductibles and co-payments.

For the **Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB)** program, the Department of Human Services (DHS) Medicaid division will pay both Part A, if applicable, and Part B premiums, deductibles and co-insurance for persons over 65 and adults with disabilities if their annual income is less than 100 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL).

For the **Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary (SLMB)** program, income for a single person must fall between 100 and 120 percent of the FPL. Medical Assistance will pay the Part B premium.

For the **Qualified Individual (QI1)** program, income must fall between 120 and 135 percent of FPL. Payment for Part B, within the QI-1 program, is limited by the availability of state funds.

The resource limits for all **MPP** programs are \$6,600 for an individual and \$9,910 for a married couple. For more information, call the Department of Human Services at 462-5300.

MEDICARE/SENIOR MEDICARE PATROL PROGRAM (SMP)

The **Rhode Island Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP)** program helps beneficiaries recognize and report Medicare and Medicaid fraud, waste, and abuse.

Medicare and Medicaid fraud, waste and abuse consists of such actions as incorrectly reporting a diagnosis, procedure, treatment or medication to get a higher payment, billing for individual mental health services when group counseling was provided, billing for brand name prescriptions when generic medications were dispensed, using another person's Medicare or Medicaid card to get services, or double-billing Medicare, Medicaid and a private insurance carrier for the same service. MEDICATION ASSISTANCE/MEDICARE PART D

Assistance in paying for Medicare Part D plan premiums and other expenses (“Extra Help”, or Low-Income Subsidy-LIS) may be available for beneficiaries with limited incomes and resources. MEDICATION ASSISTANCE/RHODE ISLAND PHARMACEUTICAL ASSISTANCE TO THE ELDERLY (RIPAE)

The **RIPAE** program pays some of the cost of **RIPAE**-approved prescription medications during the deductible phase and offers partial reimbursement for **RIPAE**-approved medications to enrollees who enter the “donut hole” of their Medicare Prescription Drug Plan (Medicare Part D). Rhode Island residents 65 and older who meet certain income limits and provide proof of Medicare Part D coverage, and adults age 55 to 64 receiving Social Security Disability (SSDI) payments, may be eligible.

Depending on income, the **RIPAE** program pays 60, 30, or 15 percent of the cost of prescription drugs used to treat Alzheimer’s disease, arthritis, diabetes (including insulin and syringes for insulin injections), heart problems, depression, anti-infectives, Parkinson’s Disease, high blood pressure, cancer, urinary incontinence, circulatory insufficiency, high cholesterol, asthma and chronic respiratory conditions, osteoporosis, glaucoma and prescription vitamins and mineral supplements for renal patients.

MEDICATION ASSISTANCE/RHODE ISLAND PHARMACEUTICAL ASSISTANCE TO THE ELDERLY (RIPAE)

RIPAE also offers limited coverage for the cost of all eligible prescription drugs used to treat Multiple Sclerosis. Only FDA approved medications (except those used to treat cosmetic conditions) are covered under RIPAE and are eligible for reimbursement in the “donut hole” of Part D plans.

Volunteers must be 55 or older and must meet specified income limits. Volunteers receive a tax-free stipend and other benefits while serving clients 20 hours weekly.

SCP volunteers serve isolated older adults in their own homes, adult day centers, and other community sites.

In an average week, **Senior Companions** visit with almost 500 elders. Over the course of more than 30 years of service to Rhode Island's seniors, volunteers have dedicated countless hours of friendship, compassion and one-to-one human contact to those in need of a helping hand, socialization and companionship.

SOCIAL SECURITY DISABILITY/SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME (SSI)

Applications for **Social Security Disability Income (SSDI)** are taken in the local field offices. The Rhode Island Office of Rehabilitative Services administers the Disability Determination Services for the Social Security Administration, and determines the medical eligibility of individuals with disabilities applying for cash benefits. The office is located at 40 Fountain Street in Providence. For information, call 222-3182. TTY users should call 421-7106, or go to www.ors.ri.gov.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) provides cash payments to qualified persons 65 and older, blind, or adults with disabilities. SSI recipients are eligible for many medical assistance, homemaker, and other services such as hearing aids, discounts on telephone and electric bills, and the assistance of a social worker. TAX INFORMATION

The **Rhode Island Property Tax Relief Program (Form RI1040H)** must be filed between January 1 and April 15. Rhode Island resident homeowners and renters with household incomes not exceeding \$30,000 may receive up to a \$300 rebate from the Rhode Island Division of Taxation.

TRANSPORTATION

Under the Americans with Disabilities Act, Rhode Islanders of any age who have a disability may be eligible for the **Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Paratransit Services**. The program provides curb-to-curb transportation service if the disability prevents an individual from using regular RIPTA bus service. Service is provided along existing RIPTA bus routes at a cost of twice the standard bus rate. Register either over the phone or by submitting an application to the office. Some **cities and towns** offer senior transportation for non-medical destinations, such as the grocery store. Call your local senior center to inquire about non-medical transportation. See the senior center section of this booklet for contact information.

TRANSPORTATION

The **Rhode Island Public Transportation Authority (RIPTA)**, 705 Elmwood Avenue, Providence, RI 02907, offers bus passes at discounted fares. Residents 65 or older pay \$17.50 for a five-year bus pass. Qualified riders who have a disability pay \$10 for a 5-year pass. Pass holders pay half-fare on off-peak hours, weekends, and holidays. Bus pass holders who are enrolled in Medical Assistance or are Group 8018 members of the Rhode Island Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Elderly (RIPAE) program may be eligible for the No Fare program. Replacement cards cost \$10 for the first replacement and \$15 for subsequent replacements. Call 784-9500, or go to www.ripta.com.

RIPTA's **Ride** program provides transportation services to those 60 and older and adults with disabilities under 60 who meet certain criteria. Transportation is generally available weekdays from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. for doctors' appointments, therapy, medical tests, adult day care, kidney dialysis, cancer treatments, and meal site lunches. There is a \$2 fee per ride. Roundtrip is \$4. Adult day clients and persons on Medical Assistance are not charged fees. Call 461-9760, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., at least 7 business days prior to appointments.
